1 Admission Requirements

A Academic Prerequisites

- (a) for the B.Sc. (OT) Programme.
6 full Ontario Grade 13 academic credits, or equivalent, to include:
English,
One of Biology, Chemistry or Physics,
One of Algebra, Calculus, Relations & Functions, or Finite Mathematics
- (b) For the B.Sc., (PT) Programme.
6 full Ontario Grade 13 academic credits, or equivalent, to include:
English,
Biology,
One of Algebra, Calculus, or Relations & Functions,
Chemistry,
Physics.

B Residency Requirements

Occupational Therapy Programme

Ninety percent of available places will be offered to qualified applicants who are Ontario residents. Ontario residents are defined as those who have resided in the Province of Ontario for at least one year prior to the proposed date of entry into the programme, and who are Canadian citizens or landed immigrants. Up to 10% of the positions could be offered to Canadians or landed immigrants from provinces other than Ontario.

Physical Therapy Programme

Ninety-five percent of available places will be offered to qualified applicants who are Ontario residents. Ontario residents are defined as those who have resided in the Province of Ontario for at least one year prior to the proposed date of entry into the programme, and who are Canadian citizens or landed immigrants. Up to 5% of the positions could be offered to Canadians or landed immigrants from Provinces other than Ontario. One position per year may be made available for a qualified visa student applicant who is sponsored by an international agency. One position per year may be made available for a qualified applicant of aboriginal ancestry who is eligible for funding by the Government of Canada.
